- 1) **Good Friday** is a day of fast and abstinence (no meat).
- 2) **Blessing of Easter food** will take place in the church on Holy Saturday afternoon, April 16, at 12:00 p.m. In some cultures, people prepare a basket of special foods (for example, meat, bread, dairy foods, eggs, cakes and pastries, wine) that will be shared at their Easter dinner. These are blessed, symbolic of the desire of Jesus to share a meal with us.


#### Easter Sunday, April 17

## Explanation of the Easter Vigil Mass,

The most sacred night of the Church year.

The Easter Vigil liturgy is the most beautiful liturgy of the Roman Catholic Church. Although celebrated Holy Saturday evening, it is the dramatic Easter vigil liturgy that marks the beginning of Easter. *We are awaiting our master's return with our lamps full and burning, so that he will find us awake and seat us at this table (cf Luke 12:35ff).* All Catholics should try to attend this beautiful service. The vigil is divided into four parts: 1) service of light, 2) liturgy of the Word, 3) liturgy of Baptism, and 4) liturgy of the Eucharist.

**1) Service of Light** The atmosphere in the Church is different: The Holy water fonts are empty, all the lights are out, the tabernacle is empty. The service begins outside the Church or at the back of the Church. A ceremonial new fire is lit and blessed. The Paschal Candle is prepared with these words while the priest marks the candle: *Christ, yesterday and today, the Beginning and the End, Alpha and Omega all the time belongs to him and all the ages to him be glory and power through every age for ever.*

The priest lights the candle from the new fire, saying: *May the light of Christ, rising in glory, dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds.*

The candle is then processed through the church, with the priest lifting the candle at three different times, singing: Christ our light (Lumen Christi) and the congregation sings in reply: Thanks be to God (Deo gratias). Everyone lights their individual candle from the Easter candle and continue until the whole church is alight. The Paschal candle symbolizes Christ, the Light of the World.

Next follows the glorious Easter song of the Catholic Church: The Exsultet (Easter proclamation). "This magnificent hymn, which is remarkable for its lyric beauty and profound symbolism, announces the dignity and meaning of the mystery of Easter; it tells the man's sin, of God's mercy, and of the great love of the Redeemer for mankind, admonishing us in turn to thank the Trinity for all the graces that have been lavished upon us." This is usually sung by the deacon or choir leader.

**2) Liturgy of the Word** During the Easter Vigil, nine readings, (seven Old Testament and two New Testament) are provided. Not all are required to be read due to time constraints, but at least three Old Testament readings must be read. These readings help us meditate on the wonderful works of God for his people since the beginning of time. The Gloria is sung before the reading of the Epistle of the Romans, and the Alleluia is sung before the Gospel.

**3) Liturgy of the Baptism** During the time of Easter water is blessed, new members who have been studying Catholicism in the RCIA program are welcomed into the Church through baptism, and the faithful are blessed with the new Holy Water and renew their baptismal promises.

**4) Liturgy of the Eucharist** The Mass resumes, with the special prayers inserted during the Eucharistic Prayer. The whole congregation is called to join at the sacrificial table that Christ prepared for us through His death and resurrection. The Mass ends with glorious... The Mass is ended, go in peace, alleluia, alleluia.

Response: Thanks to be God, alleluia, alleluia.

### Why is Saint Joseph not mentioned at Christ's crucifixion?

The last time we hear about St. Joseph in the scriptures is when he is separated from his family and found in the temple. The fact no mention is made of Joseph during Jesus' adult life, Scripture scholars presume that Joseph had died by the time Jesus began His ministry as an adult.

When Jesus was on the cross, with His grieving Mother there, He says to the Apostle John, "*There is your mother... there is your son.*" If Joseph had still been alive, then the scenario would not have taken place. Jesus did that because, in Jewish society at the time, a widowed woman with no husband or male children would not have had a lot of income, and she would have been in danger of not having a home. So, for that and other pieces of evidence that are in Scripture, it is assumed that Saint Joseph had died at some point between (the Finding of Jesus in the Temple) when Jesus was about 12-year-old, and when Christ began His ministry.
